A GIANT PROBLEM Growing to a height of over three metres, Himalayan balsam is a highly destructive invasive species, which crowds out native plants and causes erosion. W. The state of th HELP STEM THE SPREAD - #PULLSNAPSTOMP If you are out for a walk this summer, look out for Himalayan balsam and pull up a few plants. Here's what to do: Pull Individual balsam stems pull up very easily. Break off the root below the lowest growing node. Snap Stomp Put into a small pile to rot down, away from the path. Bigger piles can be stamped on to assist the rotting process.

The plants have pinky-red hollow jointed stems and shiny green lance shaped leaves. The flowers range from purplishpink to almost white in colour and are slipper shaped, appearing on long stalks between June and October.

- If the seeds have already developed then please don't pull the Himalayan balsam
- Himalayan balsam is non-toxic, but it is still advisable to wash your hands
- Leave any plants that you can't safely reach
- Don't trespass onto private land
